Traffic counter data seems abnormally high especially compared to revenue data. A bitter cold stretch kept even some of the most diehard visitors away but once the cold spell broke we were back to a more normal visitation pattern. Fishing has slowed to an almost complete halt and we have seen a slight uptick in trail use throughout the district.

#### Area Achievements

Staff has been busy doing road work and tree cutting and already working on staffing models for the 2019 season. Other assignments have included organization for Ranger Excellence School, end of the year reporting and working the Boating Safety booth at the Sportsman's Expo in Denver.

We will see an additional FTE maintenance tech added to the district in 2019; that position is announced and we are actively screening applications. Please encourage any qualified individuals to apply as the application pool is small as of yet.

Rangers have been busy with some local calls for service, including a sailboat break-in located in the marina-approved storage area at North Pines. Ranger staff has been studying to pass required training in both the law enforcement and medical disciplines.

#### Area Achievements

# Visitation Narrative:

As is typical for this time of the year on the Front Range of Colorado, the weather fluctuates significantly. With the varying weather patterns, we had some busy and some slow days. One guarantee is that if the weather is nice, we will most certainly be at or near capacity. Red Mountain Open Space is closed for the season and those numbers are not totaled on this month.



# Area Achievements:

#### Rangers:

- Rangers assisted Colorado Parks and Wildlife with a possible poaching incident near Red Mountain Open Space.
- Mountain Biker was injured on the north section of the Blue Sky trail. Rangers were
  dispatched and responded on foot. The mountain biker refused medical but appeared to
  have injured her shoulder, so a courtesy ride was given to the biker back to the trailhead and
  her vehicle.
- A portion of the Spring Trail at Horsetooth Mountain is closed for nesting Golden Eagles in the vicinity. We are actively monitoring the eagles and protecting the site during this critical nesting time.
- Rangers contacted a person living out of their vehicle parked at Fossil Creek Reservoir. Transient was evicted and issued a warning for staying in a day use area overnight.
- Ranger on patrol was notified of an open door at the CDOT building in Livermore after closed hours. Area was cleared by the ranger with no apparent trespass.

#### Maintenance/Agriculture:

- Staff have been working on reshaping the water bars and general maintenance on several of the two-track roads on the interior of the open spaces. This is to help with better runoff and durability on these roads and trails.
- A large cottonwood tree fell on a fence in Red Mountain. Maintenance staff bucked and cleared the tree and repaired the cattle fence.
- Finished the monitoring of 14 agriculture-related conservation easements.
- Took old culvert from Red Mountain and installed at the Little Thompson Farm.
- Had 300 tons of road base delivered and spread on the Red Mountain entry road.
   Maintenance staff graded and compacted it and the road looks great.




#### Visitation Narrative
