## LARIMER COUNTY INTERAGENCY OVERSIGHT GROUP MEETING MINUTES

Date: August 8, 2019

- I. Called to order by Averil Strand at 11:35 AM
- II. Welcome and Introductions
  - Introductions were made around the table.
  - Welcome to new members: Debbie Lapp of Foothills Gateway and Sarah Wooldridge of Crossroads Safe House
- III. Review and Approval of Minutes from June 13, 2019
  - Motion for approval was made by Chris Gastelle and seconded by Andy Boesenecker. Minutes approved for June 13, 2019.
- IV. Update on Larimer County's 1A Tax-Funded Mental Health Initiative
  - Laura Walker updated the Board on 1A. Ultimately, Larimer County's Board of County Commissioners oversee the funds and budget. There is a Policy Advisory Group made up of community members. A Technical Advisory Committee works under the Policy Advisory Group and includes community advocates. They work to find gaps in mental health services, making sure to comply to ballot initiatives and how funding requests are sent to the Policy Advisory Group. Some recommendations by this group have been approved by the Board of County Commissioners. The new facility has been awarded to SummitStone Health Partners and UC Heatlth as co-operators. There is always a split in funding between the brick and mortar facility and the operations. A smaller portion of funding will be for community providers to serve needs. \$1,000,000 in funding will be available by October 1 to serve gaps. 25% of those funds will be available through a Request for Proposal (RFP) process. That RFP closes at the end of August.
  - SummitStone Health Partners and UC Health have worked together to make the facility a one-stop-shop. Every level of care will be available for services.
  - The Circle Program will soon be available and provided by SummitStone Health Partners. This is a longer-term inpatient level of care for adults (18 and over) struggling with substance abuse and mental health problems. The location will be near SummitStone's Crisis Center and Poudre Valley Hospital.
  - Gaps in services for our community
    - Residential mental health for youth and children under the age of 17.
    - LGBTQ knowledgeable providers needed. Providers need to be inclusive. From all levels of services LGBTQ people are being misgendered.

- Larimer County Department of Human Services (LCDHS) will be holding a mapping of individuals with clients to see where they felt the system had failed them in hopes of learning new opportunities to be better in the future. It would be helpful to include the LGBT community in these talks.
- Laura Walker also reported on another possible tax initiative of ½ cent (intending .005 tax) tax for infrastructure and building facilities. This may be announced later in August by the County Commissioners to be put on the November 2019 ballot. This tax would help with centralizing and encompassing the Human Services Department in to one facility. See this link for more information on the half penny tax initiative. <a href="https://www.larimer.org/bocc/halfpenny4larimer">https://www.larimer.org/bocc/halfpenny4larimer</a> An ideal location would be south Fort Collins with all LCDHS staff together. Looking for volunteers to participate in a citizen group along with a public relations firm to be information points of contact. Please share this opportunity with your staff, colleagues and network contacts that may be interested in helping as a citizen voice with the public relation firm to move this initiative forward.
- V. Review and Discussion of Placement Data (attached) Sue Statz
  - Sue reviewed the placement data sheet. The rows are sorted from Family Like Setting to the most restricted placements with the columns referring to the last 13 months. County Foster Care (Family Setting) has increased in the last year because Congregate Care has decreased from last year. It is ultimately better for children to be with families. Our LCIOG goal is supporting keeping children safely with family in their communities or close to home. This promotes less trauma and impact on the children. Our LCIOG Board has a benefit if we do not have high congregate care numbers since LCDHS can funnel the funds used for congregate care back to LCIOG for services. Congregate Care outcomes are not good for youth. Detention and Commitment numbers are also down from last year.
- VI. Budget Review (attached) Sue Statz
  - Sue reviewed the most current budget sheet. Any number of children under the total of 17 in Congregate Care will be paid back to LCIOG as reinvestment funding for additional services. We are keeping children home and closer to home.
  - Sue reviewed the 3-year forecast budget. LCDHS has backfilled the budget expenses for LCIOG whenever possible but a difficult budget is forecasted for child welfare next year.
  - We met all our State Collaborative Management Program (CMP) outcomes that we chose for FY18/19. The State CMP is reviewing the outcomes we did not meet, one of those being the 75% attendance at LCIOG meetings for all board members. The State uses a calculation for a foundation that we did not meet. ALL CMP agency providers must meet the 1000 meeting threshold. Family meetings not having providers attending is another outcome the State tracks. When we don't meet their level/foundation our CMP may fall into the middle category for funding. We will wait until September to see what category we fall into.
  - The LCIOG Budget Committee (Thad Paul, Chris Gastelle, Emily Humphrey, Bob Bauman and Sue Statz) has not met for some time. Deb Bowen will coordinate a budget committee meeting soon for the committee to discuss the upcoming budget.
  - Laura Walker reported that the Colorado Department of Human Services (CDHS) has covered the Counties who overspent their child welfare budgets for the last fiscal year, ending June 30. Larimer County being one of them. Good news!
- VII. CSU Outcomes Update
  - Agenda item to be carried over to September 12 meeting. Thad Paul will report on this next month.

    - Chris Gastelle, Chief Probation Officer, reported that Juvenile Probation will be moving from the Justice Center in downtown Fort Collins to 1600 Prospect Parkway by September 16, 2019.
